Our National Network of Fellows currently is over 166 established professionals with representations in most states of India. Our network consists of individuals and organizations geographically located across the length and breadth of the country.







Developing New Generation of Leaders

LEAD Fellowship programme

LEAD is best known for its unique internationally tested and proven leadership-training programme. This training is different from others in that it creates a learning journey that not only provides universally applicable leadership skills, but also simultaneously contextualizes these skills within contemporary global environmental concerns. Our training program challenges traditional notions of leadership using progressive participatory techniques. It provides a forum for exchange of ideas, sharing of experience and a vision for collective action.

Nine new associates have joined the network for training in our International Leadership Development Programme. The new leaders are all mid-carrier professionals, representing different sectors. These new associates undergo three National Training Sessions (NTS) during their associate period, and graduated as fellows of the Programme in February 2012.

Training sessions

The Fellowship programme builds leadership skills and explores aspects of sustainable development that are particularly relevant to the participants. The theme for this year's training was 'Climate Change: Moving Towards a Low Carbon Economy', with a focus on the three sectors of power, building and construction, and transport. 1st National Training Session-

Climate Change - Moving Towards a Low Carbon Economy- The Energy Dimension

13 leaders representing different sectoral worlds came together as Cohort 14 &15 and they were gone through a learning journey around Leadership and Climate Change.

The 7 day session (17-20 April, 2011) saw the group transforming into a team during while they experienced different phases of learning at Auroville, Kanyakumari and Madurai. The session was knowledge supported by Centre for Scientific Research (CSR) in Auroville and Covenant Centre for Development (CCD) Madurai.



The session essentially aimed to develop a understanding on the shared Energy Dimension of Climate change through a blend of technical and application inputs. Leadership was at the core of the design. To cover the thematic subject, focus was laid on the following 3 highest carbon emitting sectors, viz 1. Power 2. Building Construction 3. Transport (Technology options, Mobility, Land use planning)

To this the Systems Thinking skills module was integrated in the session so as to help the Leaders develop a systemic understating of the complexities of sustainable development problems.

The Auroville module extended inputs on basic concepts, fundamental principles of the available technology options /solutions of

moving towards low carbon living. This was followed by providing an opportunity to study the application of some of these technology options at a commercial scale, community scale and household level in Kanyakumari and Madurai.



The team finally applied the learning inputs to crack a real life challenge for Migrant communities of Madurai and provided prototypes for a 'Sustainable Satellite Habitation' which will provide low cost sustainable solutions for alternate living and livelihood.

The field challenge provided the stimuli for the Leaders to apply the theoretical and practical learning into prototype solutions and have a hands on experience of integrating elements of developing a low carbon habitat. The design principles and specifications of the most adaptable prototype has been selected by the knowledge partner - Covenant of Community Development (CCD) for execution.





The session saw a week full of activities, long days, extended nights, adventurous travelling, Leaders connecting with peers and very dear LEAD Fellows in solidarity with LEAD once again!

2nd National Training Session-Climate Change - Moving Towards a Low Carbon Economy- The Community Dimension

As a part of the learning journey for Cohort 14 & 15 associates, LEAD India completed its 2nd National Training Session of its ongoing flagship Cohort Program in Leh, Ladakh during 16-23 September. Under the overall theme titled 'Climate Change: Moving towards a Low Carbon Economy' - this session focused on the community Dimension of developing a low carbon pathway. The week long session was organized in collaboration with the Ladakh Autonomous Hill Development Council (LAHDC)- the apex legislative body in Ladakh.



Along with LAHDC, NTS drew participation from globally recognized leaders like Mr Chewang Norphel, Mr Sonam Wangchuk and also that of organizations like WWF, LEREDA, SECMOL apart from local organizations in Ladakh. Relevant themes related to Energy, Biodiversity Conservation in Changing Climatic scenario, Green Buildings, Dealing with fragile ecosystems, Artificial glaciers et al were covered in the session.

A real life field challenge was designed with

the Wild Life Department where Cohort associates where required to develop a management plan for "Sustainable Economic development around Pangong Lake by enhancing tourism potential with increased community engagement"

The challenge sought specific recommendations for integrating local communities of 3 villages along the famous Pangong Lake where tourism has seen a boom after the release of popular Hindi Film 'The Three Idiots'. Currently tourism is unregulated and disorganized in this area where major benefits are earned by private tour operators from Leh and Delhi leaving the acutely poverty stricken community on the fringe.

The Cohort thus studied various dimensions of the challenge and presented guiding principles and recommendations for a low carbon tourism plan mainstreaming it as a community based enterprise.

The LAHDC found some of the recommendations innovative and useful and declared the work as a base document to develop a portfolio of interventions with budgetary allocations of the next finance. Associates appreciated the learning experience - quoting it as a "rarest of rare and life time memorable" opportunity.

International Training Session-

"Greening our economies: leadership, learning and technology for a sustainable world," at Canada

International Session (IS 2011) was held at Ottawa, Canada from $16^{th} - 22^{nd}$ October 2011, on "Greening our economies: leadership, learning and technology for a sustainable world," jointly hosted and organized by LEAD Canada and LEAD International. It focused on leadership and sustainability, in particular examining the role



that innovation, governance, business and societal action play in relation to tackling such challenges as climate change, so as to equip emerging leaders with the necessary skills and knowledge and capacity take to take on a greater leadership role for creating a sustainable world. The seven day event was structured around four core themes:

- Sustainable Business
- Sustainable Communities
- Sustainable Resources
- Sustainable Energy



Associates has attended the International Training Session at Canada from 16th to 19th of November, Ms Deepshikha Dekha of Cohort 1 facilitated and Lead the team on behalf of LEAD India. This brings the strength of the LEAD Fellows Network up to 2180 Fellows worldwide.

3rd National Training Session-Climate Change - Moving Towards a Low Carbon Economy- Policy Dimension

The third Nation Training Session & Graduation session was held at Delhi from 8 – 10 February 2012. The theme of this NTS *Climate Change: Moving Towards Low Carbon Economy': Policy Dimension*. It was extravagant three days of knowledge sharing were experts of the selected topic discussed, agued, elucidate their standpoint on their topics. The fellows have imbibed immensely through experiential learning. 10 Associates

from two cohorts 14 & 15 awarded Fellowship in the graduation ceremony and become Fellows of LEAD India. This brings the strength of the LEAD India Fellows Network up to 166 Fellows.





Enabling Actions

LEAD programme aims to achieve a positive impact in community and reach to the unreached through innovative projects. We deliver this impact through working together with our fellows and partners.

Working with communities

Building Sustainable Livelihoods in Great Nicobar Islands

LEAD is working to deliver a combination of interventions to build sustainable livelihoods in tsunami affected communities at Great Nicobar Island. **LEAD** India **LEAD** International, and The Covenant Centre for Development (CCD), run by LEAD India Fellow Muthu Velayutham, are working to reestablish sustainable livelihoods and raise awareness on health issues. The UK Big Lottery funded project will deliver a combination of interventions to enhance the capacity of farmers on integrated farming systems and support other stakeholder to improve their livelihoods. It is also promoting community enterprise activities to strengthen sustainable livelihoods.

Communities are supported to better manage their natural resources and use simple, clean technologies for their needs, improving their health. Training and capacity building activities are equipping communities with the skills to develop and implement appropriate, locally owned solutions.

Highlights from this include:

- The establishment of a Farmers'
 Federation providing a platform for these communities to come together to discuss and resolve their social, economic and political issues.
- The development of two Arecanut plate making enterprise using local materials to create bio degradable plates for resale Recruiting and training local volunteers to support health and natural resource management activities
- Established 10 poultry enterprise across the Island as sustainable livelihood option
- Coconut is one of the main crops on Great Nicobar. To maximise the value of this abundant crop two virgin coconut oil (VCO) production units were established.
- An outlet to sell the farmers' produce has started as a group activity by the federation at Campbell Bay. Vegetables and other produce are directly procured from the farmers and women's groups.





Securing Tribal Livelihoods in Odisha (STLO)

A four year project "Sustainable Tribal Livelihoods in Odisha" was screened by the BIG LOTTERY Fund, UK for submission of full proposal in second stage. A detail project proposal and business plan was developed and submitted for funding. During the process of developing final proposal a detail project feasibility study was carried out through Primary stakeholder consultations and field visits. This was followed by Business plan development workshop with all stakeholders in Bhubaneswar. The proposal was awarded for funding by BIG LOTTERY FUND, UK, in November 2011.



The project has started from February 2012 and aims to improve food security for 3,000 households, approximately 15,000 people, including women and people with disabilities (PwD) in Raygada and Gajapati district of Odisha. It will deliver a combination of interventions to enhance the capacity of households and communities to improve income though Farm and Non-Farm based livelihood options, ensuring optimum utilization of government schemes, improving health and nutrition, and integrating climate change adaptation interventions. The project will strengthen Farmers' Groups cooperative activities to establish sustainable livelihoods, encourage better natural resource management, enhance their skills base, and foster local market linkages. It will also address control of malaria, which is endemic in this region. Training and capacity building activities will equip households, groups, communities and local leaders to

utilize various Government schemes, and build resilience for disasters.

Intervention area and outreach

- Farm based livelihood interventions with 800 tribal families
- Off farm based livelihood interventions with 800 tribal families
- Linking 3000 tribal and non tribal families with government schemes and entitlements
- Strengthening local response to climate change adaptation and community health

Research Study

Rapid Assessment on the 'Need for Action' to reduce vulnerabilities to Climate change in Uttarkhand

LEAD India has undertaken the study project **'Need** for Action' to reduce vulnerabilities to Climate change Uttarkhand. The study aims to empirically establish need for technological interventions to build community resilience for Reduction of Vulnerability to climate change. Study was carried out by experts

through an intensive desk review of the literatures and series of community consultations.

The reports present insightful understanding of the sectoral situational assessment, the adaptive capacities of Van



Panchayats/ rural communities, findings related to the data gaps, and monitoring and evaluation related to climate change in the state and summarizes with the overall conclusion and recommendations. Study was funded by GIZ.



On the margins...

Project planning workshop

For developing a detailed project plan of Securing Tribal Livelihoods in Odisha project, submitted to BIG LOTTERY fund, UK, a three day participatory business plan workshop was organized from 10-12th Aug. 2011 at Bhubaneswar, Odisha. Each section of the



plan was discussed and the activity plan was finalised with groups of beneficiaries.

Meet of Indian Mountain States

LEAD India in partnership with CHEA, Nainital, organise a meet of "Indian Mountain States" (IMI) on 3rd November at IIC, New Delhi to take the initiative forward and disseminate the recommendations of the first Sustainable Mountain Development (SMD) meeting which was organized on the 21st and 22nd of May 2011 at Nainital, Uttarakhand.



The purpose of the meeting is to release the Proceedings of the Inaugural SMD Summit held at Nainital this year. Chief Guest Mr B K Chaturvedi, IAS (retd), honorary member of

Planning Commission was formally released the proceedings. Mr. Suneel Kumar Muttoo, IAS, Chief Resident Commissioner, Uttarakhand Government had presided the event.

During the meet Prof. Maharaj K. Pandit, Ms. Bharti Chaturvedi Fellow of Cohort 11, Dr. Rajnish Karki, Mr. Siddharth Barthakur and Mr. Sushil Ramola, Vice President of LEAD India presented the issues and concerns of Mountain Development. Prof. T.S. Papola chaired the session.

A gathering of 200 plus stakeholders from of diverse sections of the Civil Society - including Political leaders, Academicians, Thinkers, Policy makers, NGOs, Researchers, Scientists, Environmental Journalists - from across the North and North Eastern mountain states where participated this event.

LEAD fellow Mr Amba Jamir, Mr Sunder Subramanian of Cohort 8, Dr Pushkin Phartiyal of Cohort 9, Ms Bharti Chaturvedi of Cohort 11 and Dr Sudip Mitra of Cohort 13 were also participated in the event.

Seminar on CBD COP 11- Road to Hyderabad from Nagoya

The Ministry of Environment and Forests, GOI and International Union of Conservation of Nature (IUCN) are jointly organized a seminar on CBD COP 11- "Road to Hyderabad from Nagoya" on 17th Nov. 2011. The main focus of the seminar is mainly provides India with unique opportunity to consolidate, scale up and show case its leadership abilities on biodiversity conservation and setting the global agenda for next few years.

The purpose of the current seminar was to lay the foundation of the implementation phase of the Protocol that India would lead in 2012 COP 11 meet at Hyderabad. During the seminar the following five key issues were



taken for consideration and these five issues will be highlighting in the all parties high level segment of COP 11.

- 1. Biodiversity and Livelihoods
- 2. Integration of value of Biodiversity in National Planning and Accounting Process
- 3. Strategic Resource Mobilization
- 4. Coastal and Marine Biodiversity
- 5. Operationalisation of Nagoya Protocol



During the seminar The Director General of IUCN (The World Conservation Union) and member advisory committee of LEAD International Ms. Julia Marton Lefe' vre, The President of IUCN and Patron of LEAD India, Dr Ashok Khosla, Joint Secretary, MOEF, Mr Hem Pande (LEAD Fellow) and Joint Secretary Ministry of Environment and Forests Mr BMS Rathore (LEAD Fellow) and other Distinguished members were in the panel and issues and discussed strategy for consideration for 2012 Hyderabad Conference.

Selected team of LEAD fellows *viz*, Mr Dinesh Agarwal, Dr Archana Godbole, Mr Ganesh Pangare, Ms Pragya Varma, Ms Asha Ramachandran, Ms Anuradha Chaturvedi, Mr Deepak Apte, Ms Manisha Verma and Dr Sudip Mitra were attended this seminar. During the seminar these fellows interacted with these dignitaries for further joint partnership with LEAD India to take further involvement in the various stages of the COP 11 Conference.

Training on Profitable Agricultural Enterprises on Great Nicobar Island

Training on profitable agricultural enterprises on Great Nicobar was organised by LEAD India at the Central Agricultural Research Institute (CARI), Port Blair, from 22-24th Dec. 2011. Programme covered various aspects related to poultry enterprises, protected cultivation of high value vegetables, how to get regular and additional income from the activities linked with the integrated farming system

such as backyard poultry, vegetable cultivation, milk production, mushroom and fish farming. A separate session was organised on



value added products and their marketing system, with emphasis on mushroom cultivation.

Dr Ambast, Director CARI, preside over the programme and explained potential profitable enterprises related to agriculture and appreciated the efforts of the Sustainable Livelihood Project on Great Nicobar implemented by LEAD India.

A field exposure visit was also organized on 23rd Dec 2011. Participants visited 'Loknath Women Coco Handicraft Unit" for first-hand learning on the setup and running of a profitable enterprise. Members also visited "Krishi Vigyan Kendra" at Sippy Ghat near Portblair to view the fish farming system and integrated farming models.

Training on 'FCRA-2010 & Direct Tax Code- Implications for NGO's

LEAD India conducted a standalone training on newly enacted 'FCRA 2010 & expected Direct Taxes Code' for LEAD Fellows and representatives from associate organizations.





Need of such training was felt in the wake of lack of complete information and correct interpretation of different clauses under FCRA 2010-noncompliance to which has grave implications for NGOs. The training was facilitated by an expert Chartered Accountant Mr S. Sahoo who has an established record of auditing and advising several donor organizations and NGOs.

Inputs given helped participants understand FCRA 2010 in terms of 'good, bad and ugly' aspects of the act and also gain knowledge on the best practices for effective financial management in and accounts keeping in the changed scenario. Training was attended by 17 participants from different NGOs.

Training on Integrating Climate Change Adaptation (CCA) in Development Planning

LEAD India lead a facilitation team in a training program for GIZ staff members on a systematic approach as built on the OECD guidelines on how to 'integrate CCA in development programs and plans. The training offered a learning on practical methods of integrating adaptation related activities into development planning at different levels and sectors- both in Urban and Rural contexts. Cases of a variety of sectors such as Water, agriculture, energy, tourism, etc were used to make the tools more relevant to learning needs and current work of the participants.

Key concepts covered in the session were:

 Gaining a systemic approach – a way of Gaining a systemic approach – a way of

- systemic thinking of complex systems by applying a climate lens
- Interpreting climate information
- Four step approach (assess vulnerability, identify adaptation options, select adaptation measures, monitoring of adaptation measures)
- Developing institutional adaptive capacity
- Monitoring and Evaluation

Visit of LEAD Pakistan delegation

Lead Pakistan Director Mr. Ali has visited India and had meeting with LEAD secretariat members along with the LEAD Fellows. LEAD Pakistan proposed the collaboration with Climate Development Knowledge Network with LEAD India. The MoU was drafted and signed in this process.

Strategy Development for LEAD India 2.0

To keep pace with dynamism of concept and relevance of sustainability and fulfill the leadership gap for sustainable development LEAD India should take in order to revise its strategy. In this regards a 3 member core committee was formed for strategy development for LEAD 2.0. Meeting was held focusing on future strategy. Core committee has drafted strategy note and during the process 40 LEAD fellows were involved responded on questionnaire circulated across the LEAD India network. The strategy has been developed approved by the LEAD India board.





Reaching Out

Networking and Partnerships

We firmly believe that the field of sustainable development is a cooperative one, not a competitive one. If we are to achieve the high goals we set, we must combine our efforts with those of other actors. All stakeholders from government and corporates to civil society and donor agencies have different skills that together can help achieve the desired results. Over the last year we have endeavored to build partnerships and create links with individuals and organizations from all sectors.

Academic Institutes: In order to better understand pressing global issues, generate new studies on different aspects of sustainable development, refine our training programmes and develop new courses and approached curriculum, we have partnered with a large number academic/research institutes. These include institutes such as The Amity business school, Bhubaneswar, Indus Business Academy, Vidya Sagar College for Women, Indian Agricultural Research Institute, New Delhi, School of Environmental Sciences-Jawaharlal Nehru University, Indian Institute of Technology, New Delhi, Forest Research Institute, Dehra Dun, MS Swaminathan Research Foundation, Chennai. One of our major aims has been to generate more information about the local and regional impacts of climate change and develop courses on various aspects of this issue.

International Agencies: International development agencies, whether, multilateral or bilateral, play an extremely important role in promoting sustainable development by

raising awareness, influencing policy and supporting other organizations. LEAD India has in the past cooperated closely with such organizations to help design and deliver effective projects and trainings and exchange information and expertise. Some of the institutions we have interacted with over the last year are Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation, Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency, IDRC, UNDP, Climate & Development Knowledge Network, The International Union for Conservation. Centre for Environment Education, BHC, GIZ,

Civil Society Organizations: We work closely with other NGOs, exchanging knowledge and information and also drawing upon their expertise in their field and sharing our own. Among of the organizations we have interacted with in the last year are – LAYA, Green Biodiversity, Ekjut, Covenant Center For Development (CCD),KRAPAVIS, CHEA Sierra Club, Centre for Social Markets, Be-Able and a number of grassroots organizations.

Corporates: Corporates have a major role to play in the success of any strategy for sustainable development. At LEAD we don't believe that business is necessarily an enemy of the environment, instead we choose to work with corporates to build and expand their Corporate Social Responsibility activities and help them to become more sustainable. The corporate sector has many skills to offer that need to be tapped into. Over the last year, we have approached and engaged with many different corporates. One of our main areas of focus has been on those involved in renewable energy, and we are exploring how we can develop a project to make these technologies available to the vast regions of the country that do not have easy access to energy. These industries include Industries Ltd, Sesa Goa Limited, Institute for Development Support, Oil India Limited, NTPC



Limited and International Development Enterprises.

Government: LEAD India has also strengthened its links with government organizations such as MOEF, National Biodiversity Authority, Union Territory of Delhi Government, Lakshadweep, Ministry of Power. We have been consulting these agencies to see how we can help achieve development goals set by the country in a sustainable way. This interaction has helped us to better understand the position of the government and learn how we can best influence policy.

Networks: In addition to the organizations mentioned above, LEAD India has increased become a member of and supported national and international networks like the Credibility Alliance, United Nations Global Compact Society, CSR360 Global Partner Network (GPN), the Oran Forum and the Indian Youth Climate Network. 


