The National Network of LEAD India now includes 166 professionals from across the length and breadth of the country.







COHORT LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

Relaunch of COHORT Program

LEAD Fellowship program is an intensive, high quality, theme and field challenge based Leadership and Sustainability Development Program where LEAD has been its pioneer since 1991. It has been 23 years to the LEAD training program - this long journey on an untraveled path of creating a LEADer base to tackle sustainability issues head on can be divided into three phases.

- First phase where the Fellowship program was supported by Rockefeller Foundation and Rockefeller created LEAD International to spread the program around the globe.
- Second, when Rockefeller phased out its support in 1998 and LEAD Program was run partially through the support of LEAD International
- Third phase is the current one where the 16th batch of Cohort marks a milestone in LEAD India's journey with the training program is being run independently by LEAD India on merit and fees basis. The effort shall now be to gradually make the program self-sustaining in the coming years.

. LEAD India reinvested in the program to strengthen the network with fresh thinking and

energy and reinforce its commitment to contributing to building leadership for sustainability in country

It is a matter of pride for LEAD India to relaunch its LEAD fellowship program i.e. COHORT training after two years, on strong recommendations made by Fellows in Regional Conclaves held with them in various regions across India, to train its 16th batch of diversified mid-career professionals.

By the using different promotional medium and with support from fellows, good number of applications received. After preliminary screening process next step of selection which was Work Place Assessment was done by fellows and selected candidates interviewed by 5 member selection committee of fellows. The selection committee, after the Interview selected 14 new dynamic candidates for Cohort 16.

Developing Next Generation Leaders from 34 Countries

Next generation development programme returned to India for the 3rd time in May 2013. The NGDP programme is global sustainability leadership development programme by HSBC where a total of 102 senior manager of HSBC participated from around the world.

Compared to previous years, LEAD India played a much more prominent role in the design and delivery of the programme, and was asked to give a presentation on Sustainability in the opening ceremony in Mumbai, held on Saturday 4th May, 2013. LEAD India President, Sushil Ramola, made a presentation on behalf of LEAD India and in his capacity as CEO B-ABLE, which set the scene for the field challenges that lay ahead.

LEAD India in association with LEAD fellows identified six challenge sites for 102 participants which were divided into 6 teams for respective field visits. The participants were exposed to real field challenges and were asked to make recommendations to tackle the challenges. The visiting teams have submitted their proposals. Overall the programme was a success, and delegates felt particularly inspired by the Fellows and the decades of social capital and respect they had built in their respective challenge sites. The staff involved demonstrated exemplary commitment and efficiency for program delivery which in the words of HSBC "has raised the bar of standards"



In addition to the field challenges, LEAD India organised two Fellows' meets in Mumbai and Goa, which gave Fellows a chance to learn more about the programme and network.



Building Conservation Champions on Biodiversity and Climate Change

Under this project a series of training program has been organised across India as a part of other awareness under EEAT scheme for Ministry of Environment and forest under. The purpose of these events was to create awareness on biodiversity conservation and climate change.

The training programme was designed by LEAD India which was conducted in selected fragile ecosystem of cold desert (Leh, Jammu Kashmir) and coastal & marine (Great Nicobar Islands, A&N). A similar training was conducted in previous year in arid region of Alwar, Rajasthan.

The training was centered towards the community who are connected with their environment and protecting the same. The training has provided them with valuable basic information on biodiversity conservation and climate change.



Moreover, it has successfully facilitated informed decision making and strengthen their coping capacity with the dynamic climatic changes. The youth in the community are targeted as the major stakeholder and through capacity building & training they are being approved as the 'Community champions' taking the initiative further.





Building Youth Leadership on Sustainability at IIT Kharagpur

LEAD India associated with IIT Kharagpur as a knowledge partner to stage an event "Eco-Stasis" in Jan-Feb 2014, developed on the theme of sustainable development in IIT Kharagpur's UNESCO recognized cultural festival "Kshitij".

Eco-Stasis aimed to foster student's knowledge about ways and needs to create a secure future for the generations to come.

Total 22 teams, 80 students submitted their proposed sustainable solutions on the case study "Decentralize household energy system and biomass consumption in Madurai".

The submissions went under scrutiny by LEAD India secretariat and 12 best teams were invited to attend the festival "Kshitij".

The 12 teams were given another challenge on "Sustainable management of municipal waste of Guwahati city".

Teams presented their proposed solutions to the jury members comprising of Ms. Harleen Kaur (LEAD Fellow-C 12) and Dr. Vijai Pratap Singh of LEAD India.

The above module was widely accepted at IIT Kharagpur and willingness has been shown to continue such events in coming years in association with LEAD India.



Training of Master Trainers on 'Integrating Climate Change Concerns in Development Planning Processes'

Ms Bhawana Luthra, LEAD India; Dr Pushkin Phartiyal, CHEA; and Ms Britta freelance trainer from Germany conducted a Training of Master Trainers on 'Integrating Climate Change Concerns (Adaptation & Development Mitigation) in Planning Processes in Madhya Pradesh'. The training was held in Sanchi, Madhya Pradesh, from the 16th to 25th of July in association with The Environmental Planning Coordination ઇ Organization (EPCO) and GIZ's project Climate Change Adaptation in Rural Areas of India (CCA RAI).

The training content was customized to the needs and characteristics of the state of Madhya Pradesh and is aligned with the State Action Plan on Climate Change.

In addition, sectorial and local climate change experts (e.g. representatives from the NGO together with community members) contributed to the training content development and delivery.

The objective of the training of master trainers was to build up a cadre of professionals who understand climate change issues relevant to Madhya Pradesh as well as their relation to development processes in the state. As a result of the workshop, the master trainers are able to undertake trainings on climate change adaptation for different governmental departments and at different levels.



ENABLING ACTIONS

Securing Tribal Livelihood in Odisha (STLO)

STLO is a livelihood appraisal project of four years funded by The Big Lottery Fund, UK, which is running in Gajapati and Rayagada district of south Odisha. LEAD India is implementing the project in Gajapati directly while it has partnered with Ekjut, a LEAD Fellow organization for the implementation in Rayagada district.

STLO completed its two years of intervention in the community in February, 2014. However, these two years with the community the project had to confront many challenges where most of them

were strategically turned into opportunities which benefit and enhance the complex lives of poor tribal communities.

Now, the project has much fuller understanding of key challenges that exists in meeting project outcomes. Work has begun to introduce the target communities to various aspects of sustainable livelihoods, including farm and off farm based livelihoods and governance, community health and adaptation as cross cutting issues. The project team has actively engaged with different stakeholders including the farming and non community, farming government departments, NGOs and Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) who are continuously involved in the implementation of the project through discussion and consultation.









Key Project Activities

Annual Review

Project annual review was carried out in September 2013 to assess the partner's performance and project performance. The review committee consisted of representatives from LEAD International, UK, LEAD India, partner organization and Namita Pradhan (LEAD Fellow, Cohort-3) from Odisha as independent member. The review committee discussed the backlogs vs. targets vs. achievements with the field team, volunteers and community members and further charted an action plan for next six months.

Monitoring Visit

Paul Everett of LEAD International and Dr. Vijai Pratap Singh of LEAD India went on a monitoring visit in January 2014. The monitoring visit comprised of visits to the intervened villages, meeting with field staff and volunteers to gather first hand information on the implementation activities going on in the project area.

External Evaluation

Monijinjir Byapari was appointed for external evaluation of the project. The report has been submitted which has made constructive recommendation and appreciation of the ongoing activities.

Vulnerability Assessment

A research study was conducted which was aimed at identifying the current and future risks to livelihood and health in the project area, assessing the impact of climate variability and climate change on livelihoods and health, and highlighting the importance of integrating adaptation activities in agriculture, health and water conservation to reduce the vulnerability of the community to climate change.

Climate Change Network

To share the learning's and work together on climate change issues a network forum including local NGOs, CBOs, Government department representatives has been established in Rayagada and Gajapati districts. This climate change network will work together to create awareness on climate change issues and promote appropriate adaptation practices to reduce communities vulnerability in their area.

Farmers Exposure Visit

Exposure visits were organised for farmers to facilitate learning about developing food security model through sustainable agricultural practices. During the visit participants were exposed to sustainable agriculture through organic farming, crop diversification, integrated farming techniques and dry land farming at field of Living farms, Munniguda, Rayagada, SAMBHAV, Nayagad and MGM Agriculture Research Institute, Boudh, Odisha.

Training on Sustainable Farming

To build the capacity of farmers on sustainable farming practices a number of training events on various topics like integrated farming systems, systems of rice intensification, integrated pest management, organic farming, soil and water conservation, vegetable nursery development, etc. were organised in Rayagada and Gajapati district. More than 250 farmers benefited from these capacity building programmes.

End of Year-2 progress report

Project progress report along with financial report of year two has been submitted to the funder and accepted with year-3 financial allocations.



Climate and Development Knowledge Network (CDKN)



Sam Backerish, CEO, PwC (Price waterhouse Coopers) visited LEAD India secratariat along with Ali Sheikh CEO LEAD Pakistan and Director CDKN Asia and Mihir Bhat of All India disaster mitigation institute on 7th October, 2013 who were joined by LEAD India staff and fellows.

The meeting emphasized on taking stock of the ongoing programmes and issues faced by them in order to make a better plan for coming period of time Sam emphasized on the importance of climate change adaptation and mitigation to be integrated to the focus of livelihood and social development.

Other LEAD fellows and LEAD India staff shared their experiences of ongoing projects with discussions spanning from gender issues in development activities pertaining to climate change, carbon markets & India and associated policy issues.



OTHER ACTIVITIES AT LEAD INDIA

Committee Meeting for Resource Mobilization Strategy

During the year under the Chairmanship of Snehil Kumar, Cohort 13, Program sub-committee a initiative for resource mobilisation strategy was developed by sub-committee members, for promoting the identified products of LEAD India through Fellows engagement in different regions and sectors

Divide market in segments and regions- each region/ segment will have Fellow to anchor resource mobilization initiatives

Fellow will have the flexibility to hire services of a suitable personnel to develop partnerships

De-link the marketing efforts from Cohort program.

This strategy which offers a mechanism to rope in willing Fellows across different regions for a variety of tested products of LI

It was decided that the sub-committee should further refine the strategy with anchor Fellows as the central point, and share it with wider network for implementation for developing future strategy



Knowledge Partner in Sustainable Mountain Development Summit, Kohima

India partnered with Sustainable development forum of Nagaland as knowledge partners collaboration with ICIMOD (International Centre for Integrated Mountain Development), Ministry of Environment and forests (MoEF), Swiss Development Corporation United Nations Development Programme, Sir Rata Tata Trust, Government of Nagaland, GIZ, India Water Portal, YouthNet and YARD for the third Indian Mountain Sustainable Initiative (IMI) Mountain Development Summit in Kohima.

The main objectives of the summit were to provide a platform for the Himalayan states to come together for discussing issues of development priority and to find ways for influencing national and state public policies.

This year the core aim of the Summit was to look at, share and understand policies and governance issues based on the mentioned themes and suggest key interventions based on field experiences and intellectual inputs.

The main themes for the Summit were Sustainable Mountain Agriculture (small scale farming), Water (rivers, streams and springs) and Forests (governance, challenges and opportunities). The sub themes are ecosystem services, biodiversity conservation, and gender and climate change adaptation for mountain development.

The summit brought together participants from different Himalayan states in India to share experiences, discuss issues of development priority, and find ways to influence national and state public policies.



Supporting GIZ on Systematization Study of Adaptation Project Implemented by MSSRF

Systematization is a process that helps in producing knowledge about field-based interventions and supports effective documentation. It is a participatory exercise which helps stakeholders in reaching a common understanding of project activities through analytical reflection and interpretation of results and the different factors that influence these activities. Systematisation is an integral part of documenting lessons learnt from local adaptation measures under CCA RAI project.

Adaptation demonstration projects were carried out for the project titled "Integrated Mangrove and Fish Farming System (IMFFS) - an adaptation measure for coastal communities during November-December 2014. This exercise took place at three project villages Machlippatnam district of Andhra Pradesh and Cuddalore district of Tamil Nadu. The demonstration project is being implemented by MS Swaminathan Research Foundation, while Systematization exercise was facilitated by Bhawana Luthra from LEAD India.

The 10-day long exercise culminated in developing guidelines for effective implementation of IMFFS and suggested corrective measures for the ongoing project in Tamilnadu.

Presentations and the animated discussions that followed afterward centered round the



key questions for systematization which were "Do IMFSS increase adaptive capacities of highly vulnerable fishing communities? What is the role of gender in these changes?

The results of the various tools that were used during the exercise like Focus Group Discussions (FGD), semi-structured interviews, testimonials, seasonality mapping and cost-benefit analysis were presented before the audience.

There was active participation of women beneficiaries of the project in the meeting. Participants appreciated the role that the project has played as a catalyst in providing them with a dependable livelihood source.







New Website for LEAD India

The new website of LEAD India is launched (http://www.leadindia.org) with focused on keeping its design simple and user friendly interface while trying to be informative in brief for visitors. Several new features such as advanced fellows search engine with option of searching a fellow by their name, cohort, sector, region and expertise. To make more interactive a new section of blog space has been created to showcase success stories. LEAD India website now carries information of its genesis, partners and LEAD India secretariat. However, the major focus of providing information has been on what we do page, where visitors can learn about variety of trainings and projects LEAD India has been engaged in.

In its attempt of going dynamic and informative, the home page is a snapshot of the whole website where visitors can surf through single clicks on about **LEAD**, its vision and mission, thematic focus of LEAD India, latest announcements/news and the LEAD India network of fellows belonging from Government, academia, media, industry and civil society organizations.

STRENGTHENING NETWORK/ DEVELOPING PARTNERSHIPS

Regional Conclaves

Three regional conclaves (Bangalore, Guwahati and Goa) were organized and fellows are participated from their respective area for deliberating upon LEAD India's future strategy, networking and sharing ideas.

The regional conclaves brought together fellows on the same platform for the first time to discuss upon critical issues and agree upon constructive recommendations. Below are key suggestions made by the LEAD India fellows during regional conclaves.

- *Cohort Programme* is a flagship training of LEAD India and it must be continued with fellows' engagement and unbiased selection process of candidates
- In future LEAD's focus must be on youth and corporate for leadership training, while efforts should be made to link community leadership with ongoing projects.
- Fellows suggested to overhaul the LEAD India's website, after which a new interactive website has been launched.
- LEAD India must develop a policy guideline for fellows' engagement for smooth operations and also there is a need of defined principles of operation and function for board.

Consultation Meeting with LEAD India President and Fellows Exploring Future Opportunities

As a part of the business development process of LEAD India, New President of LEAD India Dr. Mihir Shah called a meeting with selected Fellows, Fellows who have been actively engaged in anchoring these trainings, so as to assess the potential of these products to be replicated/ up-scaled through government support or other funding linkages.

During this business development meeting LEAD India has released 5 most promising training products which are:

- Building Business Sustainability for mid carrier professionals
- Integrating climate change into development planning for practitioners, multipliers and master trainers
- Creating champions on biodiversity conservation and climate change for youth
- Understanding climate science and climate change adaptation for frontline staff of NGOs, CBOs, government line department at district and block level and PRI members
- Responsible business practices and sustainable development for managers and decision makers from industries and corporate.



New Partnership with Bee Board & Dabur India Ltd.

To strengthen natural resource base and other livelihood options in the project area LEAD India developed a proposal to promote apiculture. The National Bee Board approved the proposal and agreed to fund the two day primary training to 150 farmers and five day advanced training for 100 farmers. Further, The National Bee Board has also agreed to share 50% of the cost of bee boxes and bee hives with interested farmers.

Dabur India has given a buy back guarantee for the honey produced by the farmers providing a forward linkage.

Three training session are organized at Bolangir district of Odisha in association with Covenant.

Dr. Mihir Shah President



Dr. Shah is Member of Planning Commission, Government of India. He was adviser to the commissioner appointed by the Supreme Court of India in the Right to Food case from 2002-2009. As Honorary Adviser to the Technical Committee on Watershed Programmes set up by the Government of India in 2006, he was largely responsible for drafting its landmark report that argues for radical reforms in India's watershed sector. Dr. Shah has combined 20 years of living and working at the grass-roots with academic research and policy advocacy, deeply informed by his endeavors in the field.
